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

It was stripped to the chasis and many new parts fabricated or imported from overseas to try and return the car to as close to original as possible.

The rebuild was completed in January 1978 but is only used as a 'weekend car' so it has travelled less that 3000 miles since returning to the road.

After a season dominated by mechanical break ages, Jim Donald brought his Masport Escort RS1800 home to a most popular victory in the Club's annual CIBIE LIGHTS RALLY on Saturday 18th August. Paul Adams brought the vinyltop Escort home in second ahead of John Woolf in the Vinyltop Mazda RX3. Surprise of the rally would have to be the fourth placegetter - Steve Millen in the G.M. Dealer's Chevette which was still in left hand drive trim.



The Rally started at Motorspecs in Nugent Street at 2.30 p.m. and were flagged away by Mayor Robbie. The whole start area was a sight to behold with the start ramp, Cibie Lights banners, P.A. system and Commentator together with several hundred spectators a perfectly turned out cars - quite a sight.

Major pre-event interest surrounded Millen's Chevette and Dave Parkes who came up from the South Island specifically to compete in the rally in his Escort 1600. Unfortunately Mike Marshall was unable to get his gearbox together and was forced to withdraw.

The first three stages were in the Maramarua Forest and saw young Woolfy take out fastest time from Adams, Donald, Millen, George Kuttell (Escort RS1800) and Tony Baker (Chevette). Adams took

the second stage from Woolf, Donald, Millen with Tony Teesdale



(Escort RS1800) and Robert Van Gisbergen (RS2000) equal fourth ahead of Baker. Donald began to step up the pressure on stage three and won heading off Woolf and Adams who were equal ahead of Millen and Teesdale followed by Van Gisbergen.

The third stage was followed by a meal break and she was all on. Woolf leading on 22.90 ahead of Donald 22.97, Adams 22.99 and Millen 23.50.

The cars then headed off up to Huntly to start the first of three closed public roads and it was here Donald made his attack, coming through Frost Road about 10 seconds quicker than Adams who was ahead of Millen, Woolf, Teesdale and Kevin Rand (Escort RS1800). Lake Road was in magnificent condition and saw Adams

quickest by about seven seconds ahead of Donald, Millen, Teesdale, Woolf and Graeme De Pina (Mazda RX3). At the start of Mahuta Road Donald lead Adams by a mere three seconds, so she was all on!!! Donald was quickest through ahead of Adams and Millen with Woolf and Alan Fergus (Mazda RX3) equal ahead of Kevin Rand who was absolutely flying at this point.



The cars then toured back to the Maramarua Forest where they competed the last and longest two stages of the rally. Donald literally romped through the first of these, fully aware of how close Adams was and won the stage from Paul who was followed by Woolf, Millen, Fergus and Van Gisbergen.

The last stage was the infamous loop stage used in the Maramarua Rally earlier this year. It was on this stage the rally was to be won or lost, so she was all on with heaps of psyching at the start.



But there was no stopping Donald who really had the bit between the teeth and same through ahead of Adams, Millen, Woolf, Van Gisbergen and Teesdale. This stage also saw the most spectacular shunt in the rally which was that of Dave Glenn who more or less demolished the Group One Escort Sport in a high speed roll.

So that was it - a good win for Donald although Adams pushed him



all the way and was hampered with dust in places. Woolfy put up a good show in the early stages but fell back after the meal break. No doubt, driver of the Rally was Steve Millen who put up a splendid performance for fourth after some most impressive stage times. Steve will definitely prove a threat in the remaining championship rallies. Teesdale drove consistantly for

fifth despite distributor problems early on and one of the highlights of the event was Robert Van Gisbergen's delightful 6th overall which shows him as somewhat of a man to watch.

Another impressive performance was that of Dave Parkes who finished a very creditable 11th in his first ever rally in this area

The Rally Prizegiving was held on the Sunday Evening and was a real ripper!! Neville Holland from AHI Agencies presented the prizes and confirmed the CIBIE sponsorship for next year good one!! Interesting to note



that Motorspecs man - Gordon Seager (known to the boys as 'Gin Seager') was navigating in the lead car and was reported to be thoroughly enjoying himself.

So that's it for another year, and with two championship rounds to go we can look forward to a summer break and eventually next years CIBIE to be run at the end of April.



It's great to see so many members making use of their clubroom facilities.

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"IT'S TOUGH AT THE TOP"

That could well have been the feelings of the survivors in the Motogard Rally 79, sixth round of the World Rally Championship of Makes and a round of the World Rally Drivers Championship.

For tough it was. With 41 special stages packed into just four days driving, a new international system of timing and very tight regulation by the organisers.

This tight regulation and the new timing system resulted in the exclusion of 15 cars at the finish to produce 23 classified finishers from the original 82 car field.

It also saw the sensational exclusion of the two Deam Datsun Europe cars from the final standings. Although they had finished the event in second and sixth places overall and first and second in class, they were excluded when team mechanics refused to dismantle the engines for scrutineering by Rally Officials.

Team Leader Andy Dawson pleaded with the Japanese factory to let the cars be dismatled. Approval came too late and the popular Englishman with co-driver Kevin Gormley and the two Finns Timo Salonen and Seppo Harjanne were out.

This year the event, reduced to 2100 km to save fuel attracted five top overseas entrants, plus all top local drivers for a total entry of 82 cars. The rally ran from Auckland to Tauranga, Tauranga to New Plymouth and New Plymouth back to Auckland in three divisions with daytime rest stops in the main centres.

Number one seed for the rally was Finland's Hannu Mikkola driving a Masport Escort, one of four cars maintained during the rally by Masport Escort Service.

Right behind him in the number two spot was fellow countryman Pentti Airikkala who was debuting the General Motors Dealer Team Chevette in New Zealand. This was a particularly important event for them as a new car launch was timed to coincide with the Chevette's competition baptism of fire against the established rallying might of Ford.

This was Airikkala's first appearance in New Zealand unlike Mikkola who had competed and won here before during the 1973 international in a Ford Escort RS 1600.

Third seeded driver Ari Vatanen had also competed in New Zealand before. The young Finn drove a Masport Escort in the 1977 Radio New Zealand Rally with spectacular results.

Pitted against the might of a three-car Fiat entry Vatanen drove the rally of his life. Despite crashing three times and losing more than 30 minutes he finished second to the Fiat of Fulvio Bacchelli, only a minute behind. On one long special stage near the end of the rally, he passed all three Fiats! Consequently, Vatanen's performances in the Rothmans Escort (supported by Masport) was keenly watched.

The shield for sourth seed went to yet another Finn, this time Timo Salonen in the first of two Team Datsun Europe 160Js which were competing in the less modified group 2 category. Salonen visited New Zealand with the Fiat Team in 1977 as a spare driver, but this was his first competitive showing here.

Fifth spot went to top New Zealand driver Blair Robson of Auckland in a Masport Escort. Robson is the current National Rally Champion and his performance more than justified his seeding.

Outspoken Andy Dawson leading the Datsun team filled sixth starting position in another Datsun 160J with Jim Donald (Masport Escort), Paul Adams (Nylex Escort), John Woolf (Nylex Mazda), Mike Marshall (CRC Escort), Howard Collier (Escort), Leo Leonard (Escort) and Bob Couch (Escort) behind him.

In 15th starting spot was Tony Teesdale in the Engine Rebuilders Escort. Tony was competing in Group Two this year and was only one of a number of top locals in direct competition with the two Datsuns.

Other leading and up and coming New Zealand drivers made up the remainder of the 82 car field with particular interest being the entries of Alf Goldsbury in a Fiat 131 Racing and Shane Murland in a Group Four Chevette, built to works specifications in New Zealand.

RAINY START



After a rainy start in Auckland at 2.00 p.m. on Sunday the 15th of July, the field headed off towards Western Springs stadium for one of a number of 'spectator' stages near Auckland.

Pentti Airikkala (seen over with Mikkola) in the Chevette was a clear victor here and at the next special stage.

From there the field went to the Coromandel peninsula where II special satges before the first divisional stop in Tauranga tried car and driver. Heavy rain fell, a stage was cancelled and all drivers experienced difficulty in the trying conditions.

So by the time the weary survivors of Division One arrived in Tauranga at 6.41 a.m. on Monday July 16th the field had been pruned considerably.

As expected, Mikkola the highly professional Finn had pulled out a lead on his countrymen. He led the field, $1\frac{1}{2}$ minutes clear of Vatanen, with Airikkala nearly three minutes behind the leader. Already showing his promise was Masport Escort driver Blair Robson, up to fourth place ahead of Paul Adams and Mike Marshall in the CRC Escort.

Upsetting the start order was a young Waihi farmer, Allan Fergus in a Mazda RX3. Originally seeded 35th he was up to ninth overall at this point just seconds in front of Nelson's flying Dave Parkes who was already up to 10th in his pushrod-engined Escort. Parkes finished sixth in last year's Motogard and is established as one of the most promising young rally drivers now competing.

TELLING INCIDENTS

But already two telling incidents had taken place which would have a big effect on the result of the rally overall.

In special state 9 a car became stuck and traffic banked up behind it. Some cars did get past, but those who waited behind the stuck vehicle were subsequently considered to be excluded due to lateness and continued from the start of the second division under protest. Twenty-six cars were involved, although only 15 of these finished.

Also during this division, Team Datsun Europe leader Andy Dawson rounded a bend in a special stage at full power and with opposite lock on. A rock lodged itself in the Datsun's steering, jamming it and putting Dawson off the road for 20 minutes. He rejoined the rally but was well down in 20th starting position for the second division.

CHAMPION STARTER

Division Two with 12 special stages started in Tauranga at 4 p.m. on Monday July 16th with Denis Hulme, former world motoring racing champion as starter.

Hulme flagged away 46 cars, quite a lot fewer than had been sent off the Auckland start ramp by the Mayor of Auckland, Sir Dove-Meyer Robinson, a little more than 26 hours previously.

It's history now that the second division was very tough with long, fast forest stages interspersed with twisty touring and special stages. This division saw the beginning of a run of head gasket failures by nearly all the leading Escorts.

The vehicles of Mikkola, Vatanen, Marshall and Couch all blew head gaskets during this division. For Marshall and Couch it meant the end of their rally. For Mikkola and Vatanen it meant some very speedy repairs at the end of the division, which patched their cars up just enough to finish.

Special stage 19 in this division was the end of the Chevette's run. Pentti Airikkala and co-driver Rodger Freeth rounded a corner and the cra's engine died. Unable ti fix it in the darkness of the forest, their car was mobilised within three minutes of the arrival of their service crew.

A minor electrical connection had come astray, halting the car. By the time the repair had been made their penalty time was up and they were out of the rally. A sad end to a bold effort by General Motors Dealers in international rallying.

This division also saw retirements by Leo Leonard (engine), Jim Donald (engine failure), Howard Collier (engine), Tony Teesdale (broken driveshaft) and John Woolf (broken axle).

So it was a much depleted and weary field that drove into the New Plymouth parc ferme at about noon on Tuesday July 17, with the toughest division yet to come.



At this stage Mikkola and Vatanen were well clear of the field, despite losing considerable time having the head gaskets of their vehicles seen to by the Masport service crew.

Paul Adams, driving the rally of his life, had displaced Blair Robson for third place behind Vatanen with the hard charging Dave Parkes fifth, Allan Fergus sixth and the second Chevette of Shane Murland and Peter Parnell in seventh place overall.

TOUGH FINAL DIVISION

Just 33 cars linded up for the final 15 special stages, to be fought out over a virtual non-stop 18 hours of driving.

This was where the rallying professionalism of Mikkola paid off. He had been ordered by team mechanics to keep his engine revs down to preserve the engine and this he did, driving just fast enough to stay ahead of the opposition without damaging his car.

After the mayor of New Plymouth flagged the cars away they completed a number of special stages in the immediate New Plymouth area before heading up the west coast of the island to the first meal break in Otorohonga at 5.40 the following morning.

Once the daylight stages began, spectators flocked out to see the cars in action in this most challengine part of the entire event.

Throughout the long night, Mikkola and Vatanen maintained their lead, opening it out as necessary to stay ahead of New Zealand drivers Paul Adams and Blair Robson who by this stage were closing in as fast as they dared.

Then Vatanen's car suffered a mechanical setback which slowed him and let Robson slip into second position. Adams, lying ahead of Robson before Vatanen's mechanical troubles, lost valuable time changing three flat tyres and slipped back to fourth just ahead of Murland in the Chevette.

Parkes was four minutes behind Murland but could not close the gap despite some hard driving. Of the very fast Allan Fergus there was no sign. His engine had ingested a quantity of dirty fuel, sidelining him with just a few stages to go.

And that was how they crossed the finish line outside Turner's Car Auctions in central Auckland shortly after 5.00 p.m. on Wednesday July 18th.

Mikkola a clear victory, despite his car showing signs of another head gasket failure. Blair Robson second in a car damaged on the penultimate special stage, but still well up behind Mikkola.

A good third spot went to Vatanen. Although he crossed the finish line ahead of Paul Adams it was only by the narrowest of margins. Vatanen's car was running on three cylinders at the end and there are those who will say that it is just as well that Nelson Street (leading to the finish) is downhill, one way and that Vatanen got all the traffic lights in his favour!



Paul Adams confirmed his position as a top local driver with fourth position 35 minutes in front of Shane Murland's Chevette with Parkes sixth in the final classifications.

The Motogard Rally 79 is over now but already the planning for the next year's event has started and all indications are that we will retain our international event status. The Motogard has established New Zealand on the map of international rallies and built a firm foundation for the future of the event.


