# **EDITORIAL**

In the last month, there has been evidenced a considerable upsurge of interest in the collecting of phonecards, be it for pleasure or for profit.

The International Phonecard Fair held in Sydney on the 20th of March, attracted the greatest number of people attending any similar Fair to date. Well into the afternoon (when normally a lull occurs), collectors were still in attendance in very good numbers.

Reports from the Phonecard Fair organised by the Australian Phonecard Collectors Club in SA, also indicate that attendance and interest was very good.

Commensurate to this collector interest is an increase in the price of phonecards, including early mint cards and in particular, some of the state Collector Packs.

In this issue, readers will note the commencement of a new "department", The Grapevine, which has been introduced to keep readers in tune with the continued surge in interest. The writer, Insider, will focus on topical issues as well as provide collectors with the "inside" information on market movements.

One particular topical issue which is of particular interest (and concern) to many, is the introduction of privately overprinted Telecom phonecards. Many are watching and awaiting Telecom's reaction to this recent move as the implications of what has already ocurred, are of quite some importance. See the Special at page 10 as well as Insider's comments and the Letters to the Editor.

Readers will note that the type print in this magazine has decreased in size. This first step was taken to increase the volume of the "written word" in the magazine due to the considerable increase of material available for inclusion. A second step will continue with the May issue of the magazine when the number of pages will be increased, from the present thirty six (plus cover).

Whilst Australian "news" will predominate in the magazine, the "overseas content" will increase as it is obvious that interest in overseas countries and their phonecards is also on the increase.

In line with the increase in volume, I have had to reevaluate the present cost structure of the magazine and as a consequence, from the May issue, the price of an individual copy will rise to \$3.50. This price will remain fixed for at least 12 months, even should the number of pages further increase (with associated printing, mailing, etc. costs).

As indicated in the last Editorial, the magazine to date has been a part time hobby, but pure time and financial constraints now dictate that it be treated as a economic, (possible full time) venture. If it becomes a full time occupation, its quality will only be enhanced and you, the reader, will benefit.

Two final points to be mentioned relate to firstly, the winner of the crossword published in the January Issue. I have at this stage culled the large number of entries, to have four remaining; June McNab, Ashley Miller, Alan Hassal and J Morris. I have to seek adjudication on a few answers and again, time has 'beaten' me. Full details next issue.

Secondly, the winner of the trip to London, drawn at the International Phonecard Fair in Sydney was, Leighton Booth from Broken Hill. Congratulations.



# AUSTRALIAN NEWS UPDATE

## TELECOM UPDATE

The following is a press release as issued by Phonecard Collector Service, Parramatta:-

## **Phonecard Collectors Hotline**

Telecom has established a 0055 number. The number for calls within Australia is 0055 29469. This service will provide all the news on the current Phonecard releases; what is still available and what has sold out, the latest information on upcoming Phonecard issues and serial numbers. It will be constantly updated with details for all the most recent releases and will provide the opportunity to join the Telecom Phonecard Collectors Club".

#### Overprinting

It has been brought to Telecom Australia's attention that there has been some unauthorised overprinting on **Phonecard**. Telecom's official policy is that it does not sanction any overprinting of **Phonecard**. Collectors are advised to beware that there are some designs circulating which have **not been issued by Telecom**. The matter is currently in the hands of Telecom's legal advisers pending investigation.

## **Standing Orders**

Telecom has received many inquiries concerning a standing order system for collectors who wish to automatically be sent the latest Phonecard issues every time they are released. The Phonecard Collector Service is currently finalising such a system and it looks likely that it will be implemented within the coming months. Collectors will be notified of definite details in the future. Please **do not** contact Telecom before then regarding this matter.

## New Releases

The Endangered Species 1994, issue of Phonecard was prepared in consultation with the World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF), the worlds largest conservation organisation which has been working towards conservation of Australia's threatened species for the past 15 years. The animals featured on the Endangered Species issue of Phonecard - the Bilby, the Western Swamp Turtle and the Gouldian Finch - are amongst the most endangered in Australia and have all been the focus of WWF projects.

Australia has the worst record in the world for extinction of native animals and unless we act now,

much of our wildlife will simply cease to exist. The Phonecard Collectors Service is donating \$10,000 to WWF, which will contribute to the Endangered Species program, consisting of scientific and practical projects in the field.

A Limited Edition of 8,000 Collector Packs have been produced for this issue.

Please place orders on the official Telecom catalogue or order forms in the trade magazines (photocopies accepted). Orders that are not placed on an "official order form" will not be processed.

The official issue following the Endangered Species will be the <u>Australian Landscape Series</u>. There are seven cards in this set - one \$20, one \$10 and five \$5 cards. Each card features a site from a state or territory in Australia. The Landscape Series will be released nationally in June. Further details will be supplied in the next issue of the newsletter and on the 0055 Hotline when details are known.

In July, an official issue of Phonecard will be released to commemorate the <u>1994 Commonwealth Games</u>. There are three cards in the series, two \$5 cards and a \$10 card, featuring the sports cycling, diving and athletics. They will be available through the shops in July and in a Limited Edition Pack in the July Catalogue.

The next <u>advertising issue</u> (A) to be released will be two sets of Corporate Sponsorship cards featuring the <u>Australian Ballet</u> (\$5 and \$20) and the <u>Sydney Dance Company</u> (\$5 and \$10). Further production quantities and release date details are not known at this stage, but the cards will be released through the reseller network and be available through Telecom's mail order service.

The Landscape, Commonwealth Games and Ballet/Dance Series have not been produced as yet. Please do not place and forward orders for these cards as they will be returned.



TELSTRA ISSUES

Telstra Corporation is the holding company of Telecom Australia, or to put it differently, Telstra is trading as Telecom Australia. Telstra also trades as OTC in Vietnam, Cambodia and Christmas Island. As such, it has released series of cards for use in these countries.

#### Cambodia - 3rd Issue

A set of two cards were issued for use by the local population. The previous two issues were used only by the United Nations Peacekeeping Forces. This 3rd issue comprises a US\$2 card and a US\$5 card.





The cards use prefixes 289 and 290 in the Australian numbering system series. The exact number of each card issued is unconfirmed but it would seem that there were only a few thousand of each value - apparently the intention being that this would be a short term interim issue until a new defiitive series was printed. Rumour has it that the third series is either sold out or virtually sold out and that a new series (of 20,000 cards?) will be released shortly. The 3rd issue has been hard to get because OTC in Cambodia has refused to sell cards to collectors or dealers. The small number of cards which have reached Australia have been obtained through unofficial channels.

#### Christmas Island -1st Issue

This issue reportedly went on sale on 10 December 1993, and was sold out by mid-January 1994. Two cards were issued - a \$10 and a \$20 card, in Australian currency. This was another Telstra /OTC issue and prefixes 289 and 290 were used. The number of cards issued is open to question but may have been as few as 2,000 of each value, This also appears to have been an interim issue for short term use while the definitive series was being printed.

#### Christmas Island - 2nd Issue

This distinct issue has reportedly been on sale since the latter part of January 1994. Apparently the cards are just about sold out. The prefix numbers 384 and 385 have been used for this Telstra/OTC issue. There is a \$10 card (4000 issued) with a picture of Flying Fish Cove and a \$20 card (6000 issued) with a portrayal of the annual Red Crab migration.





These cards have been difficult to obtain because the Christmas Island Administration has put an embargo on sale of cards by mail order to mainland Australia.

## SOUVENIR COLLECTOR CARDS



# PAY TEL AUSTRALIA UPDATE

Pay Tel made its "public debut" at the recently held International Phonecard Fair in Sydney. It was an exciting day for staff, meeting Dealers and clients who up until then had only been voices on the telephone. One recurring question asked during the Sydney Fair related to the PayTel card issuing policy. This policy is firm and is restated below:-

# PayTel Australia Phonecard Issuing Policy

#### 1. General Policy

\* PayTel phonecards general

All phonecards produced by PayTel are associated with the operation of one or more groups of PayTel mobile payphones.

## \* Regular Collector Pack Issues

PayTel policy is to produce a limited number of Limited Edition packs each year. Each pack will feature a specific theme related to the appropriate User Group.

## \* Special Issues

From time to time, a special issue (single card or collector pack) will be used to commemorate some special event appropriate to a User Group. It is anticipated that these special issues will be infrequent.

## \* Pricing Collector Packs

Prices will vary according to the cards contained within each pack, but will usually not exceed \$5.00 above the total card face value.

### 2. Limited Edition Collector Packs - Release Dates

- \* User Group "A" ("Spirit of Tasmania):
- One pack issued each three months (December, March, June, September).

The March 1994 pack featured Tasmanian Wilderness Rivers. The June 1994 pack will feature early (1890's-1940's) Hobart Trams.

#### \* Other User Groups

Additional User Groups will be commissioned during the 1994 year. The release date for initial packs and/or cards for each new User Group will be advised at the time of the telephone commissioning of a particular User Group.

#### **Trams - Heritage Series**

The next PayTel Limited Edition Collector Pack is presently in the hands of PayTel's graphic artists. More news next month on this very special presentation of some of Tasmania's history - the first in PayTel's "Heritage Series".

The current Collector Pack - "Tasmanian Wilderness Rivers" - has been very well received by collectors. A large number have already been shipped to dealers and collectors and supplies will soon be in short supply.

A small number of the "Spirit of Tasmania Pack" are still available.

PayTel will be exhibiting at both Fairs in Brisbane: The Coin, Stamp and Phonecard Show and the International Phonecard Fair. Again, PayTel staff look forward to meeting with existing and new clients at both these events.

## "The Majors"

As readers will be aware, the next PACS series was to be "The Majors". Lengthy discussions have been held with Telecom Payphone Services management regarding copyright and "use of image" implications, should these golf stars appear in association with Telecom Phonecard.

The issue came to a head when a well known Australian sporting personality issued a writ against Telecom due to their use of his image in some promotional material. Telecom Payphone Services immediate reaction has been to suspend any phonecard activity involved with well known personalities without their own, or their management's express permission for their image to be used.

Whilst PACS not agree with Telecom's view, as they have copyright for the use of the photographs, there is little they can do to pursue the matter at this stage. Therefore, it is with regret that PACS announce the suspension, for the time being, of "The Majors" series. The series is not cancelled but suspended, pending further negotiations with Telecom and the players involved. PACS sincerely regret the inconvenience this has caused prospective customers, but the issue was beyond their control.

PACS have two new series with Telecom at "proof" stage and readers will be advised of the logistics of the cards when approved.

# "OVERPRINTS"


# OFFICIAL and PRIVATE - MINT and USED LEGAL or ILLEGAL - GOOD or BAD

At present, the emerging issue of overprinted phonecards is fast becoming a contentious item for Telecom Australia, for phonecard dealers and for collectors. Many collectors would not in fact be aware of the background and history and in fact, the actual definition of overprints. This article is an attempt to focus on these points and to give an indication to readers as to the implications of what is "looming over the horizon". The New Zealand & Australian scenes are featured - Editor.

Would you believe that this card



was once this card?



Or that this is the back of Telecom's \$5.00 Dinosaur Phonecard?



The latter case is believable but the former is not at all discernable unless one is aware of the background to this card.

The Dame Kiri Te Kanawa card depicted above is one of two Telecom Australia Phonecards, prefix number 375 (\$5 Dinosaur), which have been privately overprinted and attractively packaged for sale as a Limited Edition Phonecard Set. There are 1,500 sets advertised as being available.



When Did Overprinting Start?

February the 14th 1992, saw the issue of Telecom New Zealand's first phonecard set for that year.



ANTARCTIC SERIES

It was a set of four cards issued to mark the installation of cardphones at New Zealand's Antarctic Headquarters, Scott Base. A total of 5,000 of the \$20 cards were produced, whilst 6,000 of the \$50 cards were produced.

Prior to this issue, NZ Telecom's cards were produced by GPT in the United Kingdom. With this issue however, the cards were printed in New Zealand by Security Plastics in Christchurch. The \$20 cards were printed on blanks whilst the \$50 were printed on top of surplus stocks of the \$50 Satellite Card.

This was the first occasion in New Zealand that an existing issue had officially been overprinted with a new design. Whilst the "finish" to the cards is of a good quality, there have been reports that the overprinted cards are easily chipped around the edges. New Zealand Telecom's first advertising or promotional card, the Fernleaf Butter Card, was produced similar to the Antarctic series, ie., by overprinting on 1,000 surplus stock of the \$50 Commonwealth Games phonecard.



Of the <u>first</u> 1,000 <u>privately overprinted used cards</u> produced, a number were distributed free to the first 650 people attending the First National Phonecard Fair in Christchurch in <u>April 1992</u>. The balance of 350 were distributed with the Christchurch Newsletter, "Linstudy". These cards <u>did not alter</u> the original Telecom design but overprinted the words "First National New Zealand Phonecard Fair and Exhibition Christchurch", on the <u>\$5 Landscape card</u>. As indicated in last month's issue of this magazine, this overprint established a practice which is still continuing. In the March issue of the magazine also, is contained an article on Telecom's <u>official</u> Adcard promoting this years Christchurch International Phonecard Expo in April.

The <u>first private issue of a mint overprinted card</u> in New Zealand, appears to have been the <u>Hertz card</u>, of which approximately 450 were produced.



A further number of Hertz cards (4) were followed by Nissan, Auckland Taxis, Split Enz, etc., etc., cards.

The large number of private issues that have been produced, gradually improved in design and quality to such an extent, that many consider them to be of a superior nature to the official issues.

To date, New Zealand Telecom have insisted that if their mint cards were to be privately overprinted, then (a) all of the Telecom details had to be obliterated (both back & front), (b) that the card had to be sold in a bag, indicating it was not to be used in a Telecom payphone (flaking cards could cause damage) and (c) producers had to indicate that the card was a private overprint/issue.

Unconfirmed reports now indicate that Telecom New Zealand, concerned at the extent of private overprints, is <u>considering challenging this practice</u>. More information on this possibility will be provided as it becomes available.

Whilst a number of different cards have been overprinted in New Zealand, both mint and (particularly) used, individual numbers printed are not high, being as low as 50 with a high of 1,500 and an average of approx. 400 (higher number in later issues). A catalogue produced in New Zealand (featured in the March issue) lists all New Zealand overprints as well as other country cards overprinted in New Zealand. This includes 500 overprinted used Telecom Australia, \$2 Generic, phonecards, which were overprinted with details of the results of the Australian Cricket Team's Tour of New Zealand in 1993 (Tests and One Day Games).


Telecom Australia has not as yet completely overprinted (with a different design) any of its official issues as has Telecom NZ, nor is there any indication that this will happen. Telecom did however, overprint 600, \$2.00 Generic, phonecards for WAPEX 93. These cards were given out to children as they entered the Show. These cards now command a high price from dealers, with some (20 which were signed by Emma Rogers - Phonecard Collector Service) having an asking price of \$500.

<u>Unofficial overprints</u> in Australia (<u>wording printed</u> <u>on Telecom's phonecards</u>) have to date been few in number and there has in fact been little interest exhibited by collectors in them.

Early overprints included cards produced for STAMPEX 91 (both the \$2 and \$5 Generic cards which were overprinted in black and in red),



whilst in another example, the MLC overprinted the \$5 Generic with the words "Compliments of MLC". In March this year, the <u>first completely redesigned</u>, <u>mint</u>, <u>privately overprinted</u>, Telecom Australia phonecards appeared. A total of 500 cards were released for the Hong Kong 94 Stamp Exhibition and these quickly sold out to patrons. The cards are overprinted on Telecom's \$5 Environment cards.



The card is currently selling in the vicinity of \$250, reflecting the same steady increase in cost that has been evident with similar NZ Advertising cards.

Closely following the Hong Kong overprint has been the Dame Kiri overprint which is featured at the start of this article. A total of 3,000 of Telecom Australia's Dinosaur cards were overprinted (1500 x 2 cards) for the "Australian Edition" of the set, whilst a similar set of cards (2,500 sets) have been produced in New Zealand on their Telecom's cards. The Australian set is currently selling in the vicinity of \$100.

What does all this mean? Telecom Australia has shown concern at the emerging practice. Telecom is the owner of the <u>trade mark</u> "Phonecard" and as such

has indicated to dealers whom may be handling overprints, that it is "misleading and deceptive conduct" to offer for sale cards which have been overprinted without their permission but still feature the word "Phonecard". The response of those producing the Dame Kiri cards has been to withdraw them, to overprint the offending trade mark and reintroduce them into the market. Will this mean that the Trade Practices Act and the NSW Fair Trading Act are no longer interpreted as being breached by overprinting?

If a breach of the above or any other relevant Acts

If a breach of the above or any other relevant Acts cannot be seen and <u>proven</u> to be taking place, the "door is open" to a possible proliferation of mint overprints appearing on the scene. The quantity produced will be <u>determined by collector response</u>.

A number of dealers and collectors have indicated that the introduction of overprints will adversely affect the rapidly growing collection of "official" material. They feel that this new avenue of collector-tempting material will benifit only those producing the overprints and that the available dollar will only "stretch so far". I personally don't think the current market will be affected, due to two main reasons; the cost of purchasing an overprint will limit the number of people buying, whilst not being an "official card" will also influence their attraction to collectors. Conversely, the limited small printings may well attract collectors of limited editions and thematic collectors. We will have to wait and see.

One point of note, is that depending on the number of cards produced and from which print run, the actual number of mint, Telecom cards is reduced for a particular prefix. Not a major issue if 3000 cards are overprinted from a 100,000 print/prefix, but what if 3,000 of an available, Limited Edition of say, 10,000 cards are overprinted? The value of the remaining 7,000 cards will obviously be increased considerably. Readers comments on this latest development are welcomed - Editor.

# SYDNEY'S THIRD INTERNATIONAL PHONECARD FAIR

# LARGEST IN AUSTRALIA

The Australian International Phonecard Fair was held in Sydney on Sunday, 20th of March, 1993, at the Holiday Inn Menzies. It was Sydney's third major international Fair and as expected, was the largest held so far. A record number of phonecard dealers and collectors attended the Fair. A high level of phonecard activity took place from the moment the doors opened to the public at 10.00am and continued throughout the day.

Once again, most of Australia's and several of New Zealand's leading phonecard dealers attended the Fair together with Telecom Australia and for the first time, Pay Tel Australia. Australia's leading phonecard stamp and coin magazines were also represented.

Organisers were greeted with a large queue of collectors when the Fair opened. Many had lined up for the special collectors card which was on sale at the reception desk. This well produced card proved very popular with collectors, many of whom stayed all day doing the rounds of all the dealers. Many children visited the Fair and many more came with their parents. Whole families could be seen purchasing cards together for their collections. Unlike several other hobbies, phonecard collecting has a large percentage of children involved in the hobby, with the number growing all the time.

There seemed to be collectors interested in every area of Australian phonecards from the rarest mint cards to common, used, prefix numbers. Mint cards

were very much in demand, especially the difficult type cards. Collector Packs and Limited Edition Packs were widely sought after, especially the earlier State issues. The collecting of one hole cards has also expanded as the price of mint cards increase. Many dealers are finding it increasingly difficult to keep a comprehensive selection of one hole cards in stock. Interest in world cards keeps increasing with many collectors adding several foreign countries to their collecting interests. Thematic collecting is also proving much more popular. Considerable interest was also shown in the new Telstra cards from Christmas Island and Cambodia. One card per country collectors were also active at the Fair.

Telecom Australia sold all their current cards at their retail sales tables. They also met many new collectors, as well as customers and Club members from the previous Fairs. Their Archives Exhibition once again proved very popular with collectors.

Pay Tel Australia attended the Fair for the first time. They had all their current issues and collector packs for sale and launched their latest issue, "Tasmania's Wilderness Rivers".

The Fair again received excellent publicity with a section about the Fair and phonecard collecting appearing in the Sydney Morning Herald's "Good Weekend Magazine" in colour, together with an illustration of the "1994 Chinese Year of the Dog" phonecard. This magazine has a readership of 250,000. Articles about the Fair and phonecard collecting also appeared in the Australian newspaper and all the regular collector magazines. The Fair's organiser, Mark Freehill of M.E.F. Books, was interviewed on several radio stations, whilst several stations also mentioned the Fair in their "Whats on in Sydney" segments.

# WHAT DO I COLLECT NOW?

# THE GRAPEVINE

# by Insider

This column is an attempt to open up the lines of communication to the grassroots collector and will have no constraints on what is discussed within the column. If any collector would like a particular topic written about, please feel free to make a request of the column. This first article will discuss the <u>recent price explosions</u> in the market place and the consequences of the hoards of <u>unofficial overprinted Telecom phonecards</u> that are about to hit the marketplace.


Over the March period, significant price movements have been noted amongst the leading dealer price lists. These dealer lists were produced quite independently from each other and although it was expected that prices would rise sooner rather than later it was quite interesting that it occurred in the two weeks prior to the Sydney Fair and that all the dealers came up with the same sort of price rise.

Talking to dealers about this fact at Sydney, I discovered that most of them were worried that they were puting their prices up too much (the dealers do not talk to each other the week before the big Fairs!!), but as they had depleted stock levels in certain cards, they had to raise the selling price so that they could raise their buying prices to attract the sellers! It appears that most dealers ran short in the same stock at the same time. Some dealers reported that they were in fact buying some Collector Packs at \$10 less than they were selling them for prior to Sydney, unable to raise their selling price because of competitors selling prices, but unable to attract the packs in at cheaper prices. Most of the dealers simply gave up and raised both the buying prices and then put a normal mark up on top of the buying figure.

The biggest movements were for the early state packs and the Olympic pack. The major rises were as follows:-

Below is a graph showing the approximate price movement for the South Australian Pack over the last fifteen months:-



Assuming the price rises are from increased demand (Telecom says that they have 15,000 names on the mailing list now, compared with 4,000 last April), then the price rises are just beginning, as the number of new collectors is constantly increasing.

Other items to reflect upward movements were mint cards from the above packs (of course) and also a wide range of 1-hole cards from the early state series of cards. Many of these early state cards are now quite difficult to obtain and many dealer's stocks are quite low in several of these items.

The scarcest cards to obtain in good condition in 1-hole are as follows:-

\$2.00 Hockey-1st Print, \$2.00 River Murray, \$2.00 Vineyard -1st Print, \$5.00 Gold Coast, \$10.00 Brisbane, \$10.00 Telecom Tower, \$5.00 Platypus, \$5.00 Giraffe.

Some of the above are difficult to obtain because they are so easily damaged, eg., Brisbane, Gold Coast and River Murray cards, whilst others are just plain scarce - or both.

TIP 1. As the mint cards settle down (for settle down read increase in price at a slower rate than the last four weeks), the 1-hole cards will move to fill the gap left by the mint cards. Many will settle down somewhere around half way between the mint and the multi-hole cards but others will follow the mint with a difference around equal to the face value of the cards. The Geneva and the \$1.50 Christmas are examples of this, as used were nearly never created or found.

The demand for mint prefix has driven prices on the harder numbers to obtain, to around three to four times the prices fetched in December 1993, for the same cards. These prices (high as they are) will probably rise steadily over the rest of the year as dealers report no trouble selling them (when) the cards come into stock. The most notable rises have been for the following cards:-

<u>TIP 2.</u> During this time many of the reprints have been overlooked. The \$2.00 Vineyard, the \$5.00 Grand Prix and the \$20.00 Adelaide from South Australia, have only increased their prices by an average of 15 %. These cards are now looking undervalued.

#### PRIVATE OVERPRINTS

A recent development that occurred at the Sydney Phonecard Fair, was the sale of private, overprinted Telecom phonecards. These are normal Telecom cards that have been reprinted by private individuals with an eye on the collector's pocket. These cards look just like a Telecom phonecard and so may deceive collectors into thinking that they are actually official issues - THEY ARE NOT! Many dealers have expressed a strong disagreement to these unofficial overprints as they are nothing but an attempt to take money out of collector's pockets.

Let this be made clear. These cards can be printed by anyone capable of walking into a shop and buying ordinary Telecom phonecards and then taking them to a printer to have their choice of "new design" placed on the card. There are no controls over how many are printed, the person making them can say there are 500 and then print 2,000!

Whether these things succeed is completely up to you, the collector. If these first few issues (the Hong Kong Philatelic Exhibition and Dame Kiri Te Kanawa) are purchased by you the collector, you can expect a deluge of this type of "product" to come out of the woodwork. These "products" will then quickly become quite worthless in the medium to long term. These type of cards do not do well in the European countries where they were first thought up. In the UK for example, individuals with nice sounding company names and supposedly bona fide intentions (quoting a percentage of sales going to charities etc.) are producing print runs of 500 per design. Yes, only 500 and the thing is they are still on sale to dealers months and months afterwards which gives you an idea of how many people actually want them.

The situation in Germany is no different with the private cards for the local football club, etc., being produced in runs of 500 also. The German cards are actually official private cards, but since there are 2,000 different designs per year being produced, they do not have any long term mass appeal as do normal official issues. In German phonecard auctions, this group of cards are the only ones to have a low clearance rate.

Remember, only you, the collector can decide if these unofficial issues are to succeed and to make their manufacturers a large profit. If you decide to buy them, give me a ring and I'll be forced to make some too!! The writer welcomes feedback on any opinion expressed in this column and in all future columns!

# WHAT IS A PHONECARD

PART 3.

Chris Garibaldi AMERICARDS Bellevue Washington USA

As a dealer exclusivelly selling US and Canadian Cards here in the US, I read the previous two parts of this article with great interest. My response went from agreement with the problems of the US Telecard market to strong dismay at certain sentiments about the market in general, including those about "remote cards".

#### **Are These Phonecards?**

On this basic question, there seem to be two schools of thought in regards to the remote type of card. The definition that I feel will pre-dominate is "a pre-paid card used to make telephone calls" and not limited to the use in a payphone. Don Hill correctly points to the vagaries of the USA telephone network requiring a different format for pre-paid telecards to work. The telephone network is fundamentally different here and as a result the computer network based or remote telecard was developed. The remote card has obvious advantages in that it can be used with any touch-tone phone and in some cases with dial phones as well and needs no special payphone conversions. No need to be limited to that payphone on cold and rainy nights.

The remote cards are a different technology and a legitimate telephone card. The reception in the collectable world has been qualified but definitely positive. One must remember that it is estimated that there are almost 200 companies issuing telephone cards in the US now (and that will increase in 1994). This is more than there are issuing countries in the rest of the world put together! Of those 200, there are only four that issue stored memory cards at this time, the rest being remote memory.

The US Catalogue that I co-authored with Dr. Steve Hiscocks, goes a long way to helping dealers and collectors discriminate between the collectable and the "common" telecards in the US.

It is also anticipated that in the next couple of years there will be potentially more collectors in the US than anywhere else in the world. Think about it! For all its faults, the US is the largest industrialised nation in the world with the most phones and an aggressive marketing establishment. I know - it's all a bit scary.

### The Future of Phonecards

There are presently trials being run to expand the range of pre-paid cards beyond telephone use. Any place where there is a frequent exchange of small amounts of cash, there is the potential for a pre-paid Page 20 — Phonecard Monthly

card to benefit the consumer and the merchant alike. From car parks and meters to convenience stores, theatres, petrol stations and so on. Now this could be a stored memory or a remote memory card.

Because of the flexibility and added features that a computer based card offers, there are phone companies in Europe that are now considering using the system and already you can buy remote cards in England. I don't think for a minute that communication technology is going to stop here and I suspect that this present card technology will be antiquated before we know it. I think we need to be flexible to telephone card developments.

### **US Phonecard Collecting Problems**

Now having said all that as a collector who first collected cards in Australia when I lived there with my family - I prefer the stored memory cards, be they magnetic, optical or chip, because of their inherent sense of value and collectability.

The US is the "new kid on the block" - only I don't think they know it. In regards to how the US market is developing, there are indeed some disturbing aspects that send ripples of concern throughout the US telecard collecting community. America - the best of everything and the worst of everything.

This is certainly true of the issuing companies and their telecards. I don't worry too much about the "Baby Bells" (ie., NYNEX, US West, Ameritech) and the telecommunication companies that have sprung up, whose sole purpose seems to be in how to cash in on this new hobby, that cause the most concern.

Contrary to what Don Hill says about "for an outlay of only \$500,000 these companies can issue cards...", it's even worse than that!

One can have a limited edition custom card made up from any one of a number of companies for significantly less and begin marketing it as one sees fit for whatever the market will bear. These do sometimes come out at over face value and unless they are something special, I believe the collectors will largely ignore them and Darwin's survival of the fittest will do the rest.

Now where it gets interesting, is where the "Baby Bell" issues a nothing, ugly card and a no name new company issues say - a Wizard of Oz limited series. Ultimately, the collectors decide.

The task is challenging and the dilligent collector reaps the rewards. Until next time- Chris Garibaldi

Remote Memory Cards: The memory associated with a card is not built into the card itself but is in a central computer. The computer is accessed through a free phone call. One then dials the unique number printed on the card which accesses the memory relating to that particular card and then assuming their is credit, dials the number to be called. Cards are made of plastic and as they are not physically inserted into the payphone, do not suffer the wear and tear of other cards which are. # PHONECARD ISSUES

Over the last few months, considerable interest has been shown in the many issues of the Republic of South Africa. South Africa actually started trialling phonecards before Australia. Some of the confusion that exists, arises from the fact that there is and has been more than one issuing company. We are open to correction, but the way we understand it, there is the Telkom network for which both Telkom and Telkor produce cards and there is an alternate network for which Transtel are issuing cards.

After six years of trials, Telkom finally adopted a chip system for national use in 1993. The very beautifull set of five Wildlife phonecards was their first regular issue. However, take note of the issue quantities before rushing into this first issue!

We have researched all our resources and collated the following list of cards that have been issued to date. If anyone has information that would help correct or complete this listing, please contact us so that we can assist collectors in their knowledge and collecting. The prices quoted are approximate and are a middle ground of all the prices we have seen listed. This is in no way a price list of stock that we have. It is printed solely as a guide and service to collectors. Later updates can be requested from INTERCARDS by sending three (3) used Australian phonecards. - Peter Granfield

# THEMATIC COLLECTING - FLOWERS -

By Peter Granfield "Intercards"

#### Different Areas of Collecting

A large percentage of phonecard collectors, having obtained all the easy Australian cards and perhaps not currently being able to afford the expensive cards that they are still missing, have turned their attention to other areas of phonecard collecting.

Typical examples have been, one card from each issuing country, one from each type of system, test and trial cards or as in very many cases, the commencement and development of a <u>thematic collection</u>. This has been a natural progression, supported by an individual's natural interests and the inbuilt trend established over many years amonst the many people who are also philatelists.

#### **More Space**

The phonecard medium lends itself to thematic representations, even better than philately, purely on the basis that the designer has a much larger surface to use. They can even use the back of the card (see Netherlands below), which is not terribly practical on a postage stamp!

## **Advertising Revenue**

The various phonecard issuing companies have been quick to catch on to the additional revenue that can be made by catering to the thematic market. As yet however, some of the more popular themes remain elusive. For example, we have been asked on several occasions for cards on the theme of "Scouts". To our limited knowledge however, Japan and New Zealand appear to be the only countries that have used this particular theme.

#### **Card Volume**

For most collectors of Japanese cards, thematic is the only way to go, due to the fact that Japan is issuing in the vicinity of 20,000 different cards every year. World View will be doing a series of articles on some of the common themes. This month we will look at some of the interesting cards issued which feature flowers.

## FALKLAND ISLANDS

These Islands issued their first commemorative phonecard in 1992. This attractive design which was actually printed on the back of the cards, shows the Falklands coat of arms with national flowers and berries.

#### **GIBRALTAR**

Gibraltar has issued three cards with the same flower on it - the Gibraltar candytuft. The card comes in a 5 unit (collector edition) of 2,000 issue plus 100 unit and 200 unit of 10,000 issue.

#### HAWAII

Hawaii has issued a beautifull card showing a flower decorated float. Hawaiin cards are confusing in that they have on the bottom, "Card 7" or "Card 3", etc. The 7 or 3 indicates the number of call units rather than the card number.

#### **IRELAND**

This country has issued two lovely cards commemorating the "Rose of Tralee" International Festival in Kerry. The first one which is illustrated had an issue of 150,000.

#### **JERSEY**

Jersey issued commemorative phonecards in 1990, 1991 and 1992 for a float procession called the "Battle of Flowers". Later issues are not yet confirmed. The phonecards show colourful pictures of the floats, entirely constructed of flowers. The 1992 card is illustrated, while the 1991 card depicts a King Neptune scene and the 1990 card shows a giant teddy bear.

#### **NETHERLANDS**

The Netherlands gets our award for the best set on this theme so far. In 1992 they issued a set of four cards for their very famous "floriade". Besides having very attractive pictures on the front they also had fascinating designs on the back. To see the back design, which is cleverly done, much like a proof coin where the variation is between gloss and matt finish, you need to tip the cards to the light.

The 20, 45 and 115 unit cards feature vegetables, seeds and bulbs portrayed on the back. The fourth card which is of a 4 unit value, is a complimentary card of much lower issue quantity and so much more difficult to get.

#### ST LUCIA

The island of St Lucia has issued an attractive card, virtually identical to the one issued for Cayman Island. It is a low issue, for use as a Christmas card, thereby qualifying for at least two themes.

#### **SINGAPORE**

In 1991, Singapore issued a beautifull set of phonecards featuring orchards. This set consists of five cards made up of 3 x \$10 value plus a \$20 and a \$50 card. With issues of between 6-800,000 of each of the \$10 cards, they are fairly common. However, the \$50 card with only 70,000 issued is rarely seen in dealers stocks.







# LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

This month's letters were again a cross section of complimentary, critical and innovative. The following are some of the many received.

Dear Sir,

I am writing to ask about some phonecards that I saw in Sydney at the recent International Phonecard Fair in March. The cards in question are the ones featuring the New Zealand opera singer which come in a colourfull folder and the card which showed the Hong Kong Fair. Upon inspection they both appeared to be Telecom phonecards that can be used in their payphones. However, when I rang Telecom to enquire about ordering these cards direct, I was told that they are not official issues and that Telecom are considering legal action against those responsible for their manufacture. I was very angry when I discovered that their sole purpose is to take money from me and other collectors Can your magazine indicate to us, the readers, which cards coming out are official issues and which ones are just money making ventures on the part of these entrepreneurs?

It is difficult to know which cards are needed to complete collections if these bogus issues are emerging on the market and we are not informed about them.

The issue of over printed Telecom phonecards is of concern to Telecom and many collectors and dealers and has been addressed in the Editorial and the feature article earlier in this magazine - Ed.

Dear Sir.

I have been collecting phonecards since not long after their introduction and up to this year I had a full set. I received the order form for the "Tamworth" cards from Telecom on the 21st of January 1994, and posted it on the 25th. A couple of weeks later I rang Telecom to see how the order was going and was told that the "Tamworth" cards were sold out on the 27th of January. Instead of waiting for an order form for the "Year of the Dog" cards, I sent a letter to order these cards on the 17th of February, but as yet I have received no reply (Note: this letter dated 20 March - Ed.). Now that I have missed out on the "Tamworth" cards and possibly

the "Dog" cards, is it worth collecting phonecards now because my collection is incomplete?

I realise these cards can be bought from dealers around \$60 per set in a folder. Firstly, I am not interested in the folder, only the cards and secondly, I am not about to pay that amount of money for 2 x \$5 cards! I was offered a set of the "Dog" cards for \$40 and let them go for the same reason.

I understand that if I was to sell the cards I would get my money back and possibly more. I am a collector however, not a dealer or a person who buys heaps of cards to "make a killing" later on. I collect phonecards because I enjoy the hobby and I like what is on the phonecards and I have no intention to sell them.

In a "nutshell", I think the present distribution system stinks or even worse, it is putrid!

Another problem is the local resellers. Both newsagents in town sold phonecards. One went out of them because he would be out of stock for up to three weeks. The same thing has happened at the other newsagent. I have called in every afternoon after work to try to obtain the 'Dog" cards for the past two weeks but he has been out of these cards each time. In the end, he told them to "stick" the phonecards. There are other outlets in town, one of which still has the \$2 Generic in stock and the other one is still selling the Christmas issue.

I hope these points are of some interest.
