## **EDITORIAL**

This issues "Australian News Update" section outlines Telecom Australia's newly introduced standing order arrangement. An article at page 28, as provided by Rick Warnecke, also provides a collector's perspective of the arrangement outlining both a 'for and against' case for the system.

I find the proposal interesting, as I feel that at last it may give a 'true' indication of the collector base that actually exists in relation to phonecards.

Whilst Telecom's mailing list for its (now) Australian Phonecard Bulletin is said to be in the vicinity of some 18,000+, this is obviously not a true figure of the actual number of bona fide collectors, ie., the list 'genuine collector' plus his/her a husband/wife, a son/daughter, uncle/auntie, next door neighbour, etc., all of whom were co-opted by the 'genuine collector' to increase his/her chances at obtaining give-aways such as the \$1.50 Christmas card, the Tamworth (Custom) card when it first appeared (as a perceived forerunner of others) and the Limited Edition Collector Packs.

Some people have indicated to me that the standing order arrangement will mean the end of the Limited Edition Collector Packs, ie., 18,000 collectors x 5 packs. As indicated above, I don't think so, as a collector is less likely to place a deposit in a standing order account for son/daughter, etc., than he/she was in 'signing them up' for the Telecom Newsletter.

I personally feel that the committed collector base is closer to 6-7,000 at present and I venture an opinion that Telecom's standing order arrangement will not attract in excess of this number - in fact I feel it will be a lot less.

The interesting thing will still be though, as to how many (present) Limited Edition Collector Packs will be produced to cater for the forthcoming demand. Will it be in excess of the current 8,000 or, depending on customer reaction, will it actually be less?

Will dealers and speculators chance the system, ie., join up under the names of relatives, etc., on the chance that the packs will remain limited in number and therefore still be 'valuable'? With collectors being able to access them direct however, demand for purchase from dealers will lessen.

#### I await with interest developments!

With the continuing spiral in prices, many collectors have indicated they are unable to obtain accurate information as to current prices. Due to the (almost daily) fluctuations, most dealers do not produce full price lists on a regular basis anymore.

In an attempt to assist collectors, as from the September issue, this magazine will contain an INSERT which will list all Telecom, PayTel and Payphonics phonecards, by prefix and by price, for mint and used cards.

The list will be updated within 48 hours of being inserted and mailed out with the magazine.

A survey of prominent dealers in Sydney, Melbourne and Canberra will form the basis for the update literally "hot off the press". Labour intensive, but necessary to obtain an accurate indication of movements.

# PAYPHONICS PROFILE



As previewed in the last issue, a new payphone company, Payphonics, has launched a new range of payphones onto the Australian market. This company, registered in August 1993, is 100% Australian owned.

The company's founder, Craig Hamilton, has stated that Payphonics is "planned to become the market leader in its area of the difficult Australian payphones market". He has also indicated that the company "is unique in that it will tailor payphone services to closely match the individual needs of each of our sites and our customer groupings". Customer service combined with high levels of payphone quality and suitability (eg catering for the disabled) are high on the company's priority list.

#### Telecom Australia

Payphonics payphones are connected to Telecom's Telephone network. It is not intended to compete with Telecom but to provide a service in other areas. Telecom itself, is in no way involved in the activities of Payphonics, nor has it assisted the company in any way whatsover. The phonecards of Telecom and Payphonics are not interchangeable in each others payphones.

## **Company Founder**

As indicated in the last issue, Craig Hamilton was prominently involved in the engineering component of Telecom Phonecard (Prepaid Card Project) introduction until the Adelaide launch in May 1990, including:-

- . preparations for purchase of payphone equipment from Australian and Japanese suppliers,
- . payphone launch designs,
- . procedures for their installation and maintenance,
- . encoder specifications,
- . supervising acceptance testing of the first batches of payphones and phonecards in Japan and the engineering trials in Geelong and
- . many of the arrangements leading to the manufacture of Phonecards in Australia by Leigh-Marden.

#### **Payphones**

The company's payphones have been in the design phase since September 1993. They utilise the latest technologies and have been in marketing trials since early June, 1994. The payphones are reported to be of a high quality and durability. The company

advises that public reaction to the design and operating procedure has been favourable.

The payphones are designed for installation in busy locations such as shops, side walks and in clubs and community centres. The Payphonics payphones will be easily recognisable by their red colour. There may be some variations to the colour however, depending on customer choice.

The company's phonecards will be useable across the network of its payphones which include those in sites where the public has unrestricted access and so form an open user system.

## People with Disabilities

The company has advised that it will be progressively introducing a range of payphones suited to the needs of a varied customer base, including those with disabilities. Amongst the payphone range is a registered design especially formulated for people who use wheelchairs. Another provides a large visual display and dial pad to suit the requirements of the people with sight impairment. There are plans in place for a special brail based product for people with little or no ability to see. The company itself, is a sponsor of Wheelchair Sports Victoria.

#### The Installations

The company advises that the installation of card operated payphones has commenced in Melbourne and will continue in a controlled roll-out in sites in and around the city. Technical and operational performance of the payphones is being monitored to provide data for use in the payphone roll-out in other Australian states and in subsequent designs.

The present sites include;


- . "Melbourne's Smallest Shop" (affectionately known as "The Mouse Hole") adjacent to the Block Arcade off Collins Street and is destined to become a major tourist attraction,
- . the BP Service Centre at the St Kilda Marina,
- . various disabled services groups.

Payphone installations are planned, shortly, for other states.

## **New Phonecards**

The phonecard construction is a type not before used in payphones in Australia. The cards comprise a quality plastic substrate and contain securely encoded data. Images are protected by a special clear film so that they will not be damaged during normal handling or proper storage in a purse or wallet.

The cards depict a technical motif symbolising, "through purpose and elegance of form, Payphonics innovativeness blending with the skills of Australian graphic and industrial designers, to produce items of great strength, useability and beauty". (see cover of the magazine). Each card is marked "First Issue".



#### Reverse of the \$5 Card - P1

There are four card values to suit individual caller requirements - \$5, \$10, \$30 and \$50.

The following number of <u>loose cards</u> were prepared for the first issue:-

\$5	P1 First Issue	12,000
\$10	P2 First Issue	10,000
\$30	P3 First Issue	8,000
\$50	P4 First Issue	2,000

In addition, two commemorative Limited Edition Collector Packs were issued to mark the occasion of Payphonics' phonecard operated payphone launch in Australia:-

- . Pack A is limited to 2,800 packs and contains one of each of the \$5, \$10 and \$30 cards.
- . Pack B is limited to 1,000 packs only and contains one \$50 card.

Each pack is individually serial numbered ranging from one to 2,800 and 1,000 respectively.

After phonecard preparation the printing plates were destroyed so that no further prints are possible.

Based on feedback from the collecor industry, Payphonics advises that <u>high quality thematic and pictorial images</u> will be featured on later phonecard issues.

The company also advises that as it is first and foremost a payphones supplier and operator, new phonecard issues will not be over frequent.

#### Card Supplies

Phonecards will be sold at face value through resellers nearby the payphones. Payphonics has set in place a "Fair Allocation Policy" to ensure that dealers and collectors alike have ample and fair access to new issues.

During the first 30 days after issue, 50% of phonecards and packs will be available to dealers and 50% directly to collectors. However, for the first issue only, as public awareness will be

relatively low, 70% of cards and packs will be made available through dealers.

After the expiration of one month, this division will be removed and so all remaining stocks will be freely available to all. It is anticipated that Payphonics phonecards and packs can be ordered from most phonecard dealers.

Cards are available from Payphonics at face value whilst packs are available at face value plus \$10. Post, packaging and insurance fees apply - Australian deliveries less than \$100 in value \$3, greater than \$100 free of charge, overseas for each 200 cards or part thereof \$9.

#### **Phonecard Value**

Like anything, the collector response will decide the value of these cards but some key points in relation to these cards should enhance their value:-

- . first issue from a new payphone company,
- . first non-Telecom open user group,
- . growth and expansion proposals for the company,
- . first issue of both single cards and Collector packs in limited numbers.

## AUSTRALIAN NEWS UPDATE

## ALBURY HIGH SCHOOL

Albury High school is the first school in Australia to issue an official Telecom Australia Phonecard. The card depicts the majestic front view of the main building which was completed in 1928 (see article on page 26 of this issue - Ed.).



A total of 10,000 x \$2 cards will be available as single cards (4,000) and Collector Packs (6,000). About half of the single cards will be made available to the pupils and staff for the reduced donation of only \$3, with the offer to buy back perfect used copies for \$1. Not many are expected to be returned however!

The cards are expected to have been available at the end of July and can be obtained from the school as follows:-

All cards will be in safe keeping at the local Bank but they can also be purchased from Rod Pike, Chemist Shop, in Kiewa Street, Albury.

All profits from the sale of cards will go to P & C funds to help purchase school resources.

#### TELEARCH

The first of the <u>AFL series</u> of cards (Gary Ablett - "The Mark"), was due for delivery from Telecom in late July. The second card in the series (Tony Modra - "Modra Magic) is due in the last week of August. It is expected that the 3rd and 4th cards (Chris Mainwaring & Stephen Silvagni) will be

available to dealers in the first half of September, 1994.

Telearch advises that it is unlikely that any more individual player cards will be released this year. It is proposed to still issue a <u>Grand Final/Premiers</u> card as well as one depicting the AFL <u>Brownlow Medalist</u> for 1994.

In conjunction with <u>Australia Post</u>, Telearch's <u>next issue</u> of Phonecards will feature <u>stamp images</u> and will be released in the first half of October, 1994. The release will consist of 2 x \$2 cards which "jigsaw" to make up a stamp mini sheet which will be included in the pack. This will be a unique release as there are <u>four different pack designs</u>, each of 1,250 packs only, of which the artist of the stamps and the pack art, will be signing a limited quantity.

Telearch also proposes to produce phonecards in 1994, relating to significant, past, present and future <u>horse racing events</u>. A contract has been entered into with the Victorian Racing Club to produce cards featuring both "<u>Racing Legends</u>" as well as possibly, <u>winners</u> of the 1994 Melbourne Cup, Victorian Derby and the Oaks.

#### PAYTEL AUSTRALIA UPDATE

#### West Coast Railways

After some delays caused by the transference of carriage sets from V/Line to West Coast Railway, payphones are about to be installed in PayTel's first railway application.

West Coast Railway operates the Melbourne to Warnambool (via Geelong) passenger rail service, a journey of 267 km. They run thirty six single journey trips invoving 9,612 km of train operation each week. Three carriage sets are utilised to provide this service and a PayTel payphone will be installed on each set.

The large University population in Warnambool, together with commuters and holiday makers make this a well patronised rail link.

As mentioned in previous articles, PayTel will be producing three phonecards to service this new user. These cards will be of \$3, \$6 and \$10 denominations, which will be available to passengers at stations or from the train conductor and buffet attendant. Individual cards (at face value) and a limited edition Collector's Pack at \$25 will be available direct from PayTel.

The phonecards will all feature railway engines. The \$3 card depicts an 1856, British built Stephenson engine used on the original Melbourne to Geelong passenger service. The \$6 card features a

V/Line "R" Class passenger service locomotive. The \$10 card features a West Coast diesel painted in the brilliant new West Coast Railway livery (see page 11).

## **AUSTRALIAN RAILWAY** HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The ACT Division's 10,000 x \$5 phonecards are now available in Collector Packs. The cards (prefix No. 454) and Collector Pack, feature the Steam Locomotive 1210, which was constructed by Beyer, Peacock, Dubbs and Company, of Manchester, England in 1878 (see page 11).

In 1914, the locomotive 1210 hauled the first train into Canberra. Following its withdrawal from service in 1962, 1210 was placed in a plinth outside Canberra Railway Station. It remained there until September 1984, when it was removed for restoration by the ACT Division of the Australian Railway Historical Society, assisted by a grant from the Australian Bicentennial Authority. It re-entered service in 1988. Ownership is vested in the ACT Government.

An interesting sideline to the current service of the 1210 on the Michelago tourist route (Queanbeyan to Michelago - 46 km) was provided by David Daw of the ACT, who is a member of the ACT Division of the Australian Railway Historical Society. David is the owner of the two tickets numbered 1210 from the "Inaugural Train" trip (hauled by the locomotives 1210 and 3016) on 26 April, 1993. The tickets were offered for sale by tender and David's bid was successful.

#### **TELECOM UPDATE**

standing Telecom's much awaited arrangement has arrived. The recently issued edition of Telecom's revamped newsletter (now called the Australian Phonecard Bulletin) provides details on the order system proposed. Basically, Telecom has announced that "customers can establish an account with Collector Services by providing either credit card details, or opening an account, which the customer will have the responsibility of keeping in credit". Further, this will "mean you (the collector) will be guaranteed new Phonecard releases as they are issued. Customers will have the choice of automatically purchasing Limited Edition packs, advertising cards, individual designs, National issue cards, combinations of or all of the previous items".

The merits and implications of this arrangement have been addressed in the editorial and in an article at page 28 of this issue.

#### TELECOM INTERNATIONAL PHONECARD

Shown below is a \$10 phonecard with the Telecom Australia and Quantas logos on it. The card featured is one of a 1,000 (I'm told) which were issued by Quantas as a trial, to its international passengers.



The card enables users to "make up to \$10 worth of calls back to Australia from participating countries". The denomination is in A\$ and it is promoted as a "cheap way of calling back home". A user simply dials an access number, then the number required. Each call costs 40 cents connection fee "plus the Telecom Australia peak or off-peak IDD rate per minute". The card is not usable in Australia.

Quantas issued a questionnaire with the card, seeking the recipient's reaction to its idea and use.

It would appear certain that this trial will have positive results and will lead to another variety of phonecard being issued. PS Don't bother ringing Quantas as I have already obtained all of their surplus stock - Ed.





# THE GRAPEVINE

# by Insider

This month's article will discuss the current price rises, custom card issuing policy with reference to collector and investor interest (and the likely future for events as has occurred in the countries that started with phonecards earlier than here in Australia) and a report from the July Fairs.

#### **Price Rises**

Early (and not so early) collectors packs from Telecom are still on an upward trend due to a huge demand from investors and collectors. It is now emerging that there is a group of packs that are definitely harder to obtain than the others. Both groups will continue to gain in price, as all of these items are less than 10,000 in number and so will always be chased by the present collector base of more than 10,000 collectors. The two groups are as follows and are ranked in order of difficulty from top to bottom in each column:-

Why will these items always be considered as "blue chip" items whereas decimal stamps purchased in the 80's will attain their best return by "use on mail" (quoted from the Stamp News - July 1994 edition)?

Basically, a <u>limited number were produced</u> and the <u>majority were not kept in mint condition</u>. If an item is produced and you, along with everyone else, can buy as many of them as you want, then the item will never have value.

Take stamps as an example. In the 80's, everyone thought stamps were a sure fire investment vehicle so collectors and investors (including investment companies), bought sheets and sheets of postage stamps. The result now, is that 'millions' exist and this is far more than present and future stamp collectors will ever need. Hence the suggestion from "Stamp News" that decimal stamps will attain the best return by actually using them for their original purpose.

## **Custom Cards**

Custom cards are presently being bought by collectors and appear to be quite popular. I have to admit that some of the designs and themes are very striking and appealing - the Apollo Series just jumped out from the page of last month's magazine and said "buy me", so I placed an order with my local dealer straight away!

Readers have written in to this magazine and the majority have expressed the view that Telecom should make all cards which carry the Telecom logo, available through the Phonecard Collector Service in Parramatta. I fully support this view. Telecom could charge a nominal fee of say \$3 per card to cover costs which is the situation in Singapore. Even with this charge, cards would be well below what is currently being asked. Those making Custom cards to simply access the collector's pocket would then lose interest in producing them.

Why is it so important to change Telecom's issuing policy - after all, since all these issues are being printed in 'runs' of 10,000 maximum at this point in time, why should they not do as good as the Christmas \$1.50 Bird Choir which was also an issue of 10,000. The answer is, because at some point soon, Telecom are going to be releasing many more Custom cards than at present and then there is a danger of the German situation occurring here in Australia. In Germany, companies and individuals manufactured Custom cards solely for the collector and

distributed them at around four times face value. The market in Germany for this type of card has now changed. Whilst normal official issues, etc. are unaffected, the Custom cards are now being produced for their original intention which was as a company or promotional handout.

The lesson is here for all to learn. If you are a collector, you should weigh up whether you can afford the quantity of Custom cards that appear will be originating through Telecom, at their present 'mark up' rate. If you buy a custom card for investment purposes be sure to consider its 'growth potential' carefully.

## Geneva Update

This card which was previewed in an earlier issue, continues to climb steadily in value. It is commonly found amongst dealers in the \$280 - \$290 dollar range. It is only a matter of time before it reaches the \$300 mark, something that may already have happened as this issue goes to print.

## Three Weeks and Three Fairs

July 9th and 10th saw the <u>International Banknote and Phonecard Fairs</u> visit Melbourne again, smack, bang in the middle of the school holidays. Attendance was lower than expected at the two Fairs as well as at the huge Collectables Fair held at the Malvern Town Hall. It seemed the good weather combined with the school holidays managed to keep people occupied elsewhere. Dealers came from all the usual places such as New Zealand, interstate and locally. More dealers than usual attended from far afield places such as Queensland and this resulted in a very wide selection of cards from many countries being on display. The phonecard market has come a long way from just one year ago and collectors now have a big range of cards to collect just to complete an Australian set.

The variety of world cards on display was impressive and varied. Collectors do not realise the <u>effort</u> that these dealers put <u>into establishing contacts</u> to bring in these attractive world theme cards and the Australian collector has a wide choice of cards available because of this work which means that they can seek out many nice theme cards for their collections.

Whilst the 9th was to be a Banknote Fair, interestingly, there were only five actual banknote dealers in attendance on the Saturday. A TV crew visited to do a segment for the news and should perhaps have mentioned the 'other' dealings in the room as well! Many phonecard dealers hired tables for the two days and it appeared that their returns justified this action.

Dealers were keen to buy all collector packs and it was noticeable during the weekend how low many dealers stocks are in the earlier states cards and packs. I saw nothing all weekend to suggest the market was anywhere near stabilising with regard to prices. <u>Early state cards are fast disappearing</u> as is evidenced by dealers trying to buy other dealer's used stock!

## Anyone who thought that used cards were always destined to be cheap had better think again!

At the end of the two days most dealers seemed happy that sales had at least been reasonable, even if the number of collectors through the door had been less than expected.

The weekend after saw the Coin Fair and this turned out to be very well attended. Dealers who had tables at the Phonecard Fair the weekend before were not expecting a huge turnout (non Melburne dealers were beginning to think bad thoughts about Melburnians), but everyone came back from the school holidays early and attendance was good. Phonecard sales were also back to the usual levels and interstate dealers were once again happy!!

The third Fair was organised by the Australian Phonecard Collectors Club and held at Edwardstown in South Australia. Although I was unable to attend this Fair, I did hear that it was well attended with a good demand for early state packs, mint and used cards. Some world cards were available but only a limited range due to to the smaller number of dealers present. Interstate dealers do not usually travel to Club events (Edlins and Knox-Sherbrooke excepted) as apparently, expenses are so high that many dealers make a loss on interstate trips except for the International Fairs in Sydney and Melbourne - this surprised me but dealers say this is true.

Results from the Club auction were very good. A \$5 Generic pack went for over \$130 to a dealer and a bent Geelong Cartoon (I don't know which one), went for \$40! Huge interest was shown in the \$5 Landscape Series of cards and any in the room were snapped up early.

All in all, the day was deemed to be a success by all involved and attending.



## NEW ZEALAND NEWS UPDATE

## **ADVERTISING CARDS**

ROCHE Aurorix - This card was produced during April. A total of 13,500 were printed, 5,000 of which are in an AdCard Volume. About 6,000 were given to GP's in a special pack as part of an introductory package for Roche's new anti-depresssant medication - Aurorix. (see opposite page)

1994 \$50 'Year of the Dog' - This AdCard is the second on a series commissioned by the Auckland stamp dealer, A. Brodie Ltd. Last years Collector Pack of the 'Year of the Cock' is currently worth about A\$5,500!! This year's card has a print run of 4,250 of which 2,850 are in a Collector Pack, the balance are available in a numbered folder. The pack is currently worth A\$1,200, the folder is worth A\$700. (see opposite page)

New Zealand Road Safety Association - This organisation is a body set up to promote safety standards on NZ roads. With the recent spate of serious accidents on railway level crossings, it was decided to release a card to educate drivers about the dangers of this type of intersection. Each card has a \$2 donation built into it. A total of 17,500 cards were produced. The Association has 10,000 for sale, whilst 5,000 will go into AdCard Volume 6. The balance of cards was distributed to dealers. (see opposite page)

Whitcoulls Mothers Day Gift Cards - These two cards are the first in a series of combination greeting card and PhoneCard gifts. A total of 13,250 of each were produced, with 5,750 going to Whitcoulls (a large NZ stationary store) in a shrink wrapped Greeting Card. 5,000 are going into an AdCard Volume with the balance going to dealers in the Greeting Card. They retailed at NZ\$8-9 direct from Whitcoulls. These first two cards are the only gift cards that are being supplied exclusively to Whitcoulls. (see opposite page)

Tourism Rendezvous New Zealand (TRENZ) - This card was produced to commemorate the inaugural 1994 Tourism Rendezvous New Zealand Conference held in the New Zealand Exposition Centre in Auckland from 19 - 21 June. TRENZ is a forum for tourism product and service buyers from around the world to meet face-to-face with NZ seller companies. Travel companies can buy the best New Zealand has to offer from a broad range of

premier New Zealand tourism products. Out of the total 10,000 produced, 300 were given away to conference delegates, 2,000 were available for sale at the conference, 5,000 are going into AdCard Volume 6 and 2,000 into International AdCard Volume 6. The balance was distributed to dealers and kept for international trade fairs. (see below)







# FOCUS ON FARAWAY PLACES

This Month: **CYPRUS** 

## by Cyril Fox

The island of Cyprus is partitioned into two nations. The southern two thirds of the island simply known as Cyprus, is predominently Greek speaking. The northern third is Turkish and known as the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus.

Both nations have phonecards - Northern Cuprus has colourfull Alcatel cards very similar in appearance to the cards of mainland Turkey. Our focus, however, is on the southern nation of Cyprus which has been using British made GPT phonecards since 1987.

## First Issue

The first regular issue was a rather bland green and white design. Three values were issued; 2, 5 and 10 pounds. The first issue can be distinguished from the next issue of the same design by the deep notch on the righthand edge of the cards. The first issue is quite elusive today, particularly the 10 pound value of which only 5,000 were made.

## Complimentary Card

A total of 10,000 complimentary 2 pound cards were issued in 1989. These picture satelite dishes and the first issue card in minature. Today, the complimentary card is the most sought after of the Cypriot cards.

#### Second Issue

The second issue was a "re-hash" of the nondescript first issue, the only obvious difference being a small, shallow notch in place of the deep notch present on the first issue. Second issue cards are still easily found, with only the 10 pound value being a little scarce.

These cards were issued in large numbers; again only the 10 pound value card is a little scarce.

## Fourth Issue

The fourth and current issue, pictures flowers of the Akamas forest. The values are 2, 5 and 10 pounds.

# ALBURY HIGH SCHOOL 1919 - 1994

In 1994 Albury High School is celebrating its 75th Anniversary and to commemorate this special occasion, an official Telecom Australia Phonecard is being produced.

Albury High School will be the first school in Australia to issue a Telecom Phonecard.

The card depicts the impressive front view of the main building which was completed in 1928 and officially opened on March 20th by the Minister for Education at the time, The Hon. D.H. Drummond.



The Foundation Stone for this magnificent building in Kiewa Street, in the heart of Albury, was laid in 1926 by Sir Dudley de Chair, Governor of New South Wales.

The original Albury High School was established in 1919 and the first lessons for the 200 students were conducted in the **old Hospital building**, "Tin Ward", next to the gaol in Thurgoona Street.

Major building extensions took place in the 70's and 80's culminating in an official opening on the 15th of October 1982 by the Rt. Hon R.J. Mullock, Minister for Education.

Most recently, in October 1993, the Hon Virginia Chadwick, Minister for Education, opened the Language Centre using the old Principal's residence, "Corra Linn" and lessons in Italian, German, French and Japanese now take place there. Albury High School is the largest in the district with 1,200 pupils and 80 teachers and it is justifiably proud of its great tradition in academic excellence and civic involvement as well as in its sporting and cultural achievments and is widely regarded as one of the finest High Schools in New South Wales.

Of the 10,000, \$2 cards produced, 4,000 will be available as single cards and 6,000 in an attractive Collector Pack, featuring a panoramic view of nearby Lake Hume and the sorrounding mountains. The first sod, in the construction of the Hume Dam, was turned by Sir Ronald Munro-Ferguson, the Governor-General, in 1919, also 75 years ago.



All profits from the sale of single cards and Collector Packs will go to P & C funds to help purchase school resources.

Interestingly, the promoter of the card, Jim Shearing, was recently Principal of Earlsfield School in London, which produced several British Telecom Phonecards in 1992 (see separate article-Ed)



The sale of these cards also benefitted school funds as well as increasing awareness in phonecard collecting amongst the pupils. It is hoped that many children in Albury will be introduced to the hobby through the release of this card.

## EARLSFIELD SCHOOL

#### LIMITED EDITION PHONECARDS

In April, 1992 a party of school children from Earlsfield School in London, visited Glencoe in Scotland and the site of the infamous Masacre in 1692 - an event which took place exactly 300 years earlier.

To commemorate the visit, it was decided to arrange the issue of three British Telecom phonecards.

Earlsfield School chose the "MacDonalds of Glencoe" as the theme for its cards for several reasons;

<u>firstly</u>, the picture on the first two cards depicts an educational experience of great value in the school curriculum, namely, a historical drama involving all the children, which was set to music and called "The Jacobites";

secondly, the 13th of February 1992, saw the 300th anniversary of the Massacre of Glencoe - when upon a dark, dismal and wintry morning in the snowbound highlands of Scotland, a regiment of soldiers billetted on the Clan MacDonalds of Glencoe and acting under secret orders, broke faith with highland traditions of hospitality and rose to massacre their hosts;


thirdly, Glencoe is the place chosen as the focus for a school journey and for the combined disciplines of history, drama, geography and music.

# STANDING ORDERS

## QUICK...GET IN LINE!

## by Rick Warnecke

Like several thousand others, I've just received my letter from Telecom detailing their proposed standing order arrangements. For several months now, I like many other collectors have been calling for a more equitable method of allocating the shorter print limited packs. Now its here and with it comes that sense of relief and an easing of the anxious moments, sweating over whether or not you were going to get one of those beaut packs; hoping that you wouldn't have to pay heaps to a dealer when 6 weeks later you get back your "sorry, we are out of stock notice" from Telecom.

The new arrangement could be our saviour, but could there be some fresh problems for the unwary collector? After several chats with collectors from a mixed range of ages, financial situations and collecting habits, I can make a guess that there will be many collectors who will sit 'on the fence' and not send in their acceptance forms. Maybe it will be to their loss, especially if they have not decided by the return date quoted by Telecom in order to receive the pending 'new' Lifesaving Limited Issue. So, weigh up the pros and cons carefully for the long term - but make your decision a "yes" vote, even if only to get the Lifesaving issue.

Let's have a quick look at the proposal Telecom are offering. Certainly, on the surface, Telecom deserve some 'brownie points' here, as after all, they appear to be trying to offer everyone a reasonable chance of obtaining short issue packs. Let's go a bit further and pick out some of the good and maybe less good (?) points on offer.

Obviously, the key point on offer is the opportunity to get the packs and cards that you really want. Simply keep up your account balance or quote your credit card details (keeping funds up) and bingo, your looking at a very nice collection. Each and every (official) issue will find its way into your letter box and your postman will soon be privy to the fact that you are one of the select 'standing order account' phonecard collectors.

As mentioned earlier, another big plus for the system, is that of being able to buy the packs <u>at</u> <u>issue price</u> direct from Telecom. This may help us all get back to where we started in the hobby - when we could buy <u>all</u> the <u>Telecom cards</u> at <u>face value</u> or

near enough. Kids, pensioners, investors, dealers and collectors alike, all now have a fairer say in their involvement in the phonecard industry.

Okay, enough of the 'sweet talk' - how about the negatives? There are some areas of the arrangement that are already raising a few eyebrows. Firstly, hopefully only as a result of circumstances beyond their control, Telecom state that they cannot guarantee supply! As I said, hopefully this case of the 'extreme' is not expected to happen and there won't be any supply problems?? Secondly, Telecom state that the prices are subject to change without prior notice. Great, when is the public float? On to the six weeks notice for cancellation - a reasonable request as long as Telecom gives an equal time of six weeks notice about pending issues. To date, that has not always been the situation and if this area does not improve, then I can see Telecom and the collector getting into a bind with each other. It could mean a lot more work for Telecom to cancel and to re-open accounts on what could be almost a

Still the 'baddies' come. A couple of collector friends are not overly happy with the arrangement condition concerning the return of damaged goods. This condition basically says that Telecom will supply the same Phonecard product of the same value, subject to stock availability. Fine, but having sent back several damaged cards into this system, I know too well not to expect the return cards to be in any better shape. What if this is to happen with your Limited Edition pack? Do you send it back, only to be told that there are none left in stock?

Now, what about the 'real big baddie' - Telecom Payphone Services reserve the <u>right to withdraw</u> the standing order arrangement at any time. I thought the arrangement was a legally binding document and was to make it easier for all collectors to guarantee that you never miss out on a new Phonecard release again? Guess I was wrong....!

Enough of the doom and gloom - there are enough good points to play with to maybe pacify even the harshest critic (me). The serious collector has been catered for - or at least we are in the early stages for that to happen. More packs will be produced and that will hopefully see the end of the 'in and out' investor/collector. Maybe then we will get to see some realistic and rational prices - ones that grow at a genuine pace.

Lets give Telecom a hand - help get this standing order arrangement off the ground; after all, we are the ones whom will benefit in the long term. Sure, have your say about what you don't like with the system - send your views to this magazine. I'm sure that if enough sensible replies are received, Telecom would consider changes for the better. After all, they have a multi-million dollar business so its in their interests to keep the majority of collectors happy!

# LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

One of the topics that has been of concern to me over my 20 plus years of collecting coins, stamps, porcelain and now phonecards, has been the fact that very few collectors turn their mind to disposing of their collections after they are dead.

I have been approached by the survivors of some collectors and asked to "point them in the right direction" in relation to having collections, of which I have knowledge, valued and/or sold and, on occasions, to arrange for the sale of same.

I therefore thought I would submit for your consideration the enclosed article which goes some small way towards highlighting the need for any collector to consider the disposition of his/her collection on his/her demise.

I will not be offended if this article does not find its way into your magazine, but I do think the topic should be brought to the attention of collectors at some time and in some way, particularly given the extraordinary gains currently being made in the value of phonecards and Collector Edition Packs.

The writer of this letter is an Adelaide based Solicitor with an extensive background in collecting. The letter and following article highlight an (often) little considered aspect of the hobby.

## Benefit or Burden? Where There Is A Will There Is A Way

Countless numbers of collectors spend literally millions of hours each year assembling their cherised collections. However, the average collector spends almost no time considering the proper and orderly disposal of his/her collection when the time comes. Too few of us are able to oversee the disposal of our collections and accordingly, where untimely death intervenes, this task is left to our administrator/executor if a Will has been made.

Commonsense demands that every collector who values his/her collection must have a Will. A Will may leave "that part of my estate constituting my real and personal property known as my Australasian Phonecard Collection" to Tom, but it may also guide either the administrator/executor and/or Tom as to how to dispose of the estate.

It is important that the collector consider giving direction either within the Will itself, or separately, to those expected to survive him/her as to how to value and/or dispose of the assets left behind.

There are a number of ways of doing this.

First, the Will itself may provide that a particular auction house be engaged to sell the collection with the proceeds gained thereby to be divided in such a way as the testator (Will maker) desires amongst certain named beneficiaries.

Second, the administrator etc. may be instructed, in the

- (a) to dispose of all assets through a general (specified) auction house;
- (b) to dispose of certain parts of the collection/s through specific auction houses or dealers (thereby picking "horses for courses"); or
- (c) the administrator may be directed to a named intermediary who will agree to exercise his/her skill in arranging, for maximum return and minimum effort on behalf of the administrator/executor (who is often one of the bereaved), the orderly sale of the collection or collections through appropriate persons or entities.

If an intermediary is to be used, that person must first be approached and asked to consent to undertake this work. I have been advised that any dealer of the Australian Stamp Dealers Association will do this type of work for a nominal hourly charge and they are obliged to act with total integrity by virtue of the ASDA Code of Ethics.

I am firmly of the opinion that any other type of intermediary must be independent of both the collector making the Will and the beneficiaries. I also believe it is desirable that he/she agree not to offer to buy all or any part of the collection. If this is not done, then the intermediary potentially has a conflict of interest, given that the intermediary must also be knowledgeable in the particular field of collecting and is therefore almost certainly an active collector in the field.

Finally, care must be taken in selecting someone to prepare your Will. Remember, if you use a Trustee Company, more likely than not, that Company will charge your estate a percentage calculated on a sliding scale depending on the value of your estate for its work in selling your assets, eg., a percentage of the total value of your estate will go to the Trustee Comany.

Telecom has approved the production of \$2 phonecards in relation to both Advertising and Custom cards. There will be no \$2 cards in Telecom's Official issues, ie., the cards you buy either from Telecom or "over the counter" at shops. Your \$5 Willy is certainly worth at least \$60 - Ed.

Dear Sir,

Thank you for raising my concerns regarding Telecom's issuing policy re Custom cards (APM May 1994). Whilst I understand their approach, I still feel that Telecom should find a way to sell all cards produced by them, direct to the collecting public, if not in packs, then by individual cards or sets.

Many collectors of Australian phonecards (myself included) would like to have one of each official Australian Phonecard in their collections, ie., those that bear the Telecom logo. We like to be complete in our approach to collecting and as matters now stand, this is not possible. It is my opinion that in the long run this will be detrimental to the hobby.

On another matter, I come to phonecard collecting from stamps and coins (which I still collect). I have always found the Cinderella items within these two fields to be of great interest, ie., revenue stamps, local stamps, game tokens, transport tokens, etc., and I find the same interest in Cinderella phonecard items. Items such as the Club promotion cards and the Telecom speciman and business cards. As the hobby progresses, I predict that these will gain a greater following.

I would like to see in the "Phonecard Monthly", an in depth article about the Telecom speciman and business cards, featuring full size colour reproduction. I feel that such an article would be of interest to others as well. In addition, if you can provide full size colour reproductions of these cards, those of us who do not have them can see what they look like "in the flesh" as it were and could cut out the illustrations to put into our collections as space fillers until we can obtain/afford the real thing. Keep up the good work - I look forward to seeing the magazine continue to grow.

I have been collecting phonecards for a few months now and find collecting them to be an interesting and rewarding hobby. The reason I am writing this letter is to express some concern that phonecard collecting is moving too fast for an average collector. Telecom, in my opinion, should limit the amount of Official phonecards to approximately seven per year. That way an average collector might have a chance to collect all of the Official cards issued for the year.

I have found Limited Edition Packs hard to obtain and I have a suggestion for Telecom on issuing these:

- 1. Limit one pack per collector on the basis of 75% of the total issue of 8,000, ie 6,000 collectors "will be happy";
- 2. Dealers to have 2,000 packs (25%) allocated to them. I don't find Telecom's 70% public and 30% dealers allocation to be fair and equitable.

These do exist and were issued by the Wollongong payphone depot to test that the phones would accept the high value when first introduced. They had the word 'TEST' written on the back with a thick, black felt tipped pen, in the box for writing your phone number.

As far as the value goes - how many would you like to have duplicated? The black ink after time is absorbed by the card and can not be totally removed so the card can no longer be sold as a normal used card. To my mind, it therefore becomes worth less than a normal \$50 card, unless you can convince a serious collector that this is a genuine test card on the basis of a known supplier in Telecom, which this collector had.

My analysis is that it is a totally wasted, expensive card. Without the TEST it would be worth - say \$70-\$80, with the TEST, I would say it is worth \$10!


